Benefits of a Theatre Minor

- Presentation of self and communicating narrative/stories
- •Analytical skills (of texts, characters, audiences, etc.)
- Problem solving
- •People skills (ability to work collaboratively with a variety of people)

- •Understanding of different audiences
- Voice and movement (Can you control your body, especially in front of an audience? Can you safely speak to be understood?)
- •Collaboration (learning to work as an ensemble)
- •Turn ideas into concrete products
- •Listening
- Practical design skills (how to best present a specific kind of space/location, realistically or non-realistically)
- Storytelling
- •Quick-thinking and able to adapt quickly to new situations/dynamics
- •Learning to hone instincts
